fascinating and controversial examination of how evolutionary theory sheds light on human nature using reproductive issues as a focus in 1791 the french femme de lettres olympe de gouges wrote that as women have the right to take their places on the scaffold they must also have the right to take their seats in government this book explores the issues of female emancipation through the history of female execution from the burning of joan of arc in 1431 to the events of the french revolution concentrating on individual victims the author addresses the sexual attitudes and prejudices encountered by women condemned to death she examines the horrific treatment of those denounced as witches and reveals the gruesome reality of death by hanging

burning or the guillotine in an attempt to uncover the historical truth behind such figures as joan of arc anne boley manon roland and charlotte corday she goes beyond biography to consider their deaths in symbolic terms she also considers writers such as genet yourcenar and brecht and their treatment of the tragic sacrificial and erotic aspects of female execution a band of hermaphrodite gunslingers fight for their lives in a desert infested with crispy black demons along with a motley collection of survivors including a sex crazed female samurai modified to resemble a bipedal stegosaurus they take refuge in the only safe haven left telos a strange town near the end of the world where the citizens have televisions instead of heads my worst fear happened my husband of 15 years left our 6 year old daughter downstairs watching et kissed me and left to walk the dog he never came home he was hit by a car and was killed he was 39 sex death and tantra is the story of my first years as a single gay widower dad embracing my grief parenting a grieving child attending to her educational social emotional needs all while trying to create a wholly new life for myself tantra while intense and wildly pleasurable sex is a part of tantra it is not tantra tantra is a set of principles and practices most of which are not sexual which transcends the self for decades i sought a marriage of sex and spirituality yet these practices seemed to exclude gay men the year prior to zachary s death we met ken and began our study of tantra with him ken was a successful psychotherapist who taught tantra to gay men he had a separate erotic healing practice where he used tantra eroticism and sex to help men do profound emotional psychological healing work he was a father he was a husband he was a sacred whore tantra is not an easy path zachary and i each dealt with painful psychological and emotional issues as we deepened our spiritual selves our

erotic knowledge and experience it was also sexy and fun i got a taste of how sex highly pleasurable conscious sex can be a pathway towards healing personal growth and spiritual awakening feeling lost and afraid sitting in the hospital with zachary s wrecked lifeless body i called ken and we began our journey together we explored grief my grief using tantra as our foundation from that day forward ken and i met most days at 5am before my daughter awoke for tea meditation erotic practices and conversation i credit him with saving my life after zachary s sudden death sex death and tantra is not only a story about love and loss but one of optimism and healing reminiscent of spanbauer s the man who fell in love with the moon my story chronicles an uncommon radical application of tantra which transcends gender and orientation my story is real raw erotic and emotional while this is not a definitive tantra text many tantric principles and practices are brought to light this book is a personal reappraisal of psychoanalytic theories in the light of clinical experience the first part is about sexuality and begins where psychoanalysis began with hysteria the second part is about the ego and the super ego the relationship of which dominated freud s writing from his middle period onwards the last part is on narcissism and the narcissistic disorders a major preoccupation of psychoanalysis in the second half of the twentieth century in this book the author examines attitudes to sexuality in britain with a special emphasis on the prudery fear and hatred of deviance that underly those attitudes he describes the self hatred that often leads to persecution of homosexuals and sufferers of venereal disease including aids a provocative and haunting collection of short stories that probe two of the most powerful forces shaping the human experience the drive for life for survival and reproduction and the drive for death for violence and self destruction are the two dominant instinctive urges of human behaviour these conflicting compulsions characterized by freud as eros and thanatos are also the central themes of great literature in sex and death some of today s most compelling writers from around the globe kevin barry lynn coady robert drewe ceridwen dovey damon galgut petina gappah sarah hall peter hobbs ziyun li alexander macleod ben marcus jon

treatment discusses the innovations introduced by each of the papers in the collection shows how gillespie s ideas influenced by his own contributions and affected the field as a whole the first contemporary ethnographic account of urban life in china sex death and hierarchy in a chinese city studies both public and private life including such aspects as religious belief gender images family life and sexual attraction death for bacteria is not inevitable protect a bacterium from predators and provide it with adequate food and space to grow and it would continue living and reproducing asexually forever but a paramecium a slightly more advanced single cell organism under the same ideal conditions would stop dividing after about 200 generations and die death for paramecia and their offspring is inevitable unless they have sex if at any point during that 200 or so generations two of the progeny of our paramecium have sex their clock will be reset to zero they and their progeny are granted another 200 generations those who fail to have sex eventually die immortality for bacteria is automatic for all other living beings including humans immortality depends on having sex but why is this so why must death be inevitable and what is the connection between death and sexual reproduction in sex and the origins of death william r clark looks at life and death at the level of the cell as he addresses such profound questions as why we age why death exists and why death and sex go hand in hand clark reveals that there are in fact two kinds of cell death accidental death caused by extreme cold or heat starvation or physical destruction and programmed cell death initiated by codes embedded in our dna bacteria have no such codes we learn that every cell in our body has a self destruct program embedded into it and that cell suicide is in fact a fairly commonplace event we also discover that virtually every aspect of a cell s life is regulated by its dna including its own death that the span of life is genetically determined identical twins on average die 36 months apart randomly selected siblings 106 months apart that human tissue in culture will divide some 50 times and then die an important exception being tumor cells which divide indefinitely but why do our cells have such programs why must we die to shed light on this question clark reaches far

back in evolutionary history to the moment when inevitable death from aging first appeared for cells during the first billion years death when it occurred was accidental there was nothing programmed into them that said they must die but fierce competition gradually led to multicellular animals size being an advantage against predators and with this change came cell specialization and most important germ cells in which reproductive dna was segregated when sexual reproduction evolved it became the dominant form of reproduction on the planet in part because mixing dna from two individuals corrects errors that have crept into the code but this improved dna made dna in the other somatic cells not only superfluous but dangerous because somatic dna might harbor mutations nature's solution to this danger clark concludes was programmed death the somatic cells must die unfortunately we are the somatic cells death is necessary to exploit to the fullest the advantages of sexual reproduction in sex and the origins of death william clark ranges far and wide over fascinating terrain whether describing a 62 year old man having a major heart attack and how his myocardial cells rupture and die or discussing curious life forms that defy any definition of life including bacterial spores which can regenerate after decades of inactivity and viruses which are nothing more than dna or rna wrapped in protein this brilliant profound volume illuminates the miraculous workings of life at its most elemental level and finds in these tiny spaces the answers to some of our largest questions love sex death boredom ecstasy existential angst political upheaval the history of literature offers a rich and varied exploration of the human condition across the centuries in this absorbing companion to literature's rich past arranged by days of the year acclaimed critics and friends stephen fender and john sutherland turn up the most inspiring enlightening surprising or curious artefacts that literature has to offer find out why 16 june 1904 mattered so much to joyce which great literary love affair was brought to a tragic end on 11 february 1963 and why roy campbell punched stephen spender on the nose on 14 april 1949 in this sumptuous voyage through the highs and lows of literature's bejewelled past for centuries people have debated the nature of the human self running

times i m so glad they have each other and that we have this maggie nelson you only live twice is an intelligent ode to enchantment to the possibilities that arise in their second lives when all past expectations have been foreclosed chris kraus the writing is out of the park strong and surprising a relay race of brilliant twirling tossing thoughts back and forth like balletic rugby bros joynt and hoolboom s dances of disclosure are so courageous and generative gifts to us all john greyson what if it s not true that you only live once in this genre transcending work of true fiction trans writer and media artist chase joynt and hiv positive movie artist mike hoolboom come together over the films of chris marker to exchange transition tales confessional missives that map out the particularities of what they call second lives chase s transition from female to male and mike s near death from aids in the 1990s chronicling reactions from friends and families medical mechanics and different versions of coming out volt explores art love sex death and life in changed bodies the unspoken promise was that in our second life we would become the question to every answer jumping across borders until they finally dissolved man and woman queer and straight mike hoolboom is an author and filmmaker based in toronto he has written four books received more than thirty international film prizes and enjoyed nine international retrospectives of his work chase joynt is a toronto based moving image artist and writer who has exhibited his work internationally he recently received a mellon fellowship in arts practice and scholarship at the university of chicago the 2018 netflix series altered carbon is a vital contribution to the cyberpunk renaissance among such titles as snowpiercer or blade runner 2049 this collection of new essays answers the question is this increasing popularity of cyberpunk a sign of recognition of the genre s transgressive aspects such as a stark critique of capitalism or is it the opposite a sign of the genre s failure to successfully criticize modernity the contributors consider the series as taking on current issues from a critique of neoliberalism through the ethical aspects of biotechnology up to thanatology they provoke questions about what it means to be human in a world in which death does not exist essays

evaluate the surging popularity of the series and cyberpunk at large from a variety of critical perspectives shedding new light on a challenging and inventive series is ageing inevitable or can senescence and death be evaded large animals and plants always age if they live long enough even individual cells from their bodies cannot continue living and dividing indefinitely whether or not single celled organisms also age and die and what relation sex bore to the process of senescence was the subject of vigorous debate and experimentation early in the last century in this book dr bell disinters and reanalyzes these forgotten experiments and argues that protozoan lineages do indeed senesce as the result of an accumulated load of mutations that can be shed only through sexual reproduction this unexpected connection between sex and death is the central theme of a book that will interest all students of evolutionary biology sexuality and senescence ian mcewan s works have always shown an interest in the question of how fiction operates this interest does not usually manifest on the formal level a few of the early stories aside his fictions are not formally experimental mcewan tends to opt for those reliable patternings of space time and narrative progression that enable readers to trust the authorial environment sufficiently to identify with characters and become invested to some extent in what happens to them despite mcewan s commitment by and large to naturalistic means of telling a story his later novels also demonstrate a concern with opacity as characters often pursue courses of action for reasons that are unclear to them equally often these actions bear some relation to the intrinsic opacity or enigma of one s sexual desires one s relation to one s mortality or one s relation to the actions of those human beings who have gone before one as this book will show it is this focus on enigma in mcewan s work whether sexual mortal or historical that lends it to a psychoanalytic reading such as the kind pursued in this book because for psychoanalysis there is no such thing as full access to one s self or to one s feelings or motivations given that one s relation to history is also opaque in the sense that one grasps fully or imagines one grasps fully only those historical events which predate

or otherwise excludes one this study seeks historical reasons for why mcewan sometimes blocks readerly identification with characters in the early fiction for these characters are also products of their environments environments which the characters relative opacity and unlikeability seems to offset and exaggerate or present in a manner showcased for one s judgment and in this way the characters environment is denaturalized to say the least this book reveals how all of these works explore to some extent the human tendency to act and feel in particular situations in profound contradistinction to how one might prefer to think one would this failure to coincide with one s image of how one would have expected or preferred to behave the innocent s leonard marnham is not the cool experienced lover of his imaginings any more than solar s michael beard is going to revamp his lifestyle or career produces instances of affective or imaginative excess troubling images or feelings that can often only be allayed or dealt with by a further failure to coincide with one s desires in this book author eluned summers bremner shows that mcewan s interests in opacity not only become clear in significance and import but that his interests in human failure to coincide with one s views about the past and hopes for the future also appear as what they are an ongoing concern with how one relates to the complex operation of human history it s hard to know when you re having a breakdown in new york city the symptoms of living here succeeding here and losing your mind here are almost identical so begins matousek s 1996 breakout memoir about leaving a fast track publishing life working for pop artist andy warhol at interview magazine and hitting the dharma trail in search of a meaningful life and spiritual wisdom hailed by publisher s weekly as brave beautiful and brilliantly observed sex death enlightenment became an international best seller published in 10 countries like elizabeth gilbert in eat pray love and paul monette in borrowed time matousek takes the reader on an insightful rollicking search for answers to life s deepest questions in this landmark memoir mark matousek takes you everywhere his title promises and then some sex death enlightenment is the most gripping and
