in understanding the rapid developments of the health care industry and offers timely policy recommendations for reforming managed care as well as advice for patients making health care decisions the book covers everything from start up troubles with the first managed care organizations to attempts at government regulation to the mergers and quality control issues facing mcos today it also reflects on how difficult it is for patients to shop for medical care up until the 1970s patients looked to autonomous physicians for recommendations on procedures and hospitals a process that relied more on the patient s trust of the physician than on facts and resulted in skyrocketing medical costs newly emerging mcos have tried to solve the shopping problem by tracking the performance of care providers while obtaining discounts for their clients many observers accuse mcos of caring more about cost than quality and argue for government

regulation dranove however believes that market forces can eventually achieve quality care and cost control but first mcos must improve their ways of measuring provider performance medical records must be made more complete and accessible a task that need not compromise patient confidentiality and patients must be willing to seek and act on information about the best care available dranove argues that patients can regain confidence in the medical system and even come to trust mcos but they will need to rely on both their individual doctors and their own consumer awareness in no other country has health care served as such a volatile flashpoint of ideological conflict america has endured a century of rancorous debate on health insurance and despite the passage of legislation in 2010 the battle is not yet over this book is a history of how and why the united states became so stubbornly different in health care presented by an expert with unsurpassed knowledge of

the issues tracing health care reform from its beginnings to its current uncertain prospects paul starr argues that the united states ensnared itself in a trap through policies that satisfied enough of the public and so enriched the health care industry as to make the system difficult to change he reveals the inside story of the rise and fall of the clinton health plan in the early 1990s and of the gingrich counterrevolution that followed and he explains the curious tale of how mitt romney's reforms in massachusetts became a model for democrats and then follows both the passage of those reforms under obama and the explosive reaction they elicited from conservatives writing concisely and with an even hand the author offers exactly what is needed as the debate continues a penetrating account of how health care became such treacherous terrain in american politics
